The Top Vintage Furniture Trends

1. Shabby Chic

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Wait, wasn't that a 90s thing? Yes, it was, but shabby chic, which includes soft colors, comfortable, overstuffed seating and distressed wood furniture is back, and for good reason. Almost any home can pull it off and it's very livable.

2. Mid-Century Modern

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Mid-Century Modern furniture is much like the name implies. It was popular during the middle of the 20th century.

Much of it was originally made in Denmark or in other parts of Scandinavia. Its streamlined looks and warm wood (often teak) gives it durability, functionality and a classic look that rarely goes out of style.

3. Art Deco

Modernism was an early 20th Century departure from the ornate furniture that was popular during the 19th Century. It uses multiple materials, such as leather, steel, and even plywood. Modernist furniture is known for unique, often curvy, lines and sometimes bizarre and interesting shapes.

How to Make Everything Old New Again



Paint or stain?

In most cases, re-staining your furniture will help keep the vintage look. One exception is Shabby Chic. you might want to keep its peeling veneer or even lightly sand and add another coat. Lightly sand the new coat as well to give it its distressed look.

If you decide to keep a natural wood color, you want to remove all the old paint or stain, sand it and re-stain it. Today, there are no limits on wood color. Dark wood, light wood and everything in between is in style. And unlike in days past, it's fine to mix wood tones. Many like to keep warm tones with warm and cooler tones with cool, but that's a personal choice.




How to reupholster


